The Nexus between Disabilities and Human Trafficking

Despite global and regional efforts to combat human trafficking, there's a significant oversight regarding the nexus between disability and trafficking in international treaties and national strategies. Research and testimonies highlight the vulnerability of persons with disabilities to trafficking, yet current provisions are inadequate. For instance, the OSCE 2021 Survey Report noted a concerning trend of traffickers targeting people with disabilities. In Southeast Asia, despite commitments under the ASEAN Convention against Trafficking in Persons, implementation varies across member states. Urgent measures are needed to address the unique challenges faced by persons with disabilities in trafficking situations, especially during conflicts and crisis situations. The lack of knowledge about these challenges underscores the need for investment in research. In response, the OSCE, US Department of State, and ASEAN are jointly organizing a side event to present their data and findings on the nexus between disabilities and human trafficking. The event will also see the launch of two research papers developed by the OSCE and ASEAN respectively, that aim to strengthen the evidence base, highlight the impact on persons with disabilities, and assess the integration of disability concerns in legal and policy frameworks.



Collective story-telling: Women for women, youth & diaspora engagement in reshaping human trafficking prevention.

This side-event highlights young diaspora women's innovative solutions to combat human trafficking. The event aims to raise awareness of the impact of young diaspora women and address persistent gender inequalities fueled by patriarchal cultures, social vulnerabilities, and discrimination. The event, proposed by the Migration and Human Trafficking Council under the Speaker of the Parliament of the Kyrgyz Republic, provides a platform for diaspora women leaders to fight discrimination and assist women in avoiding crime during migration. It will showcase support initiatives by the Migration and Human Trafficking Council, focusing on rights, representation, and resources to foster gender equality and women's empowerment. Through structured discussions, speakers and attendees will explore strategies to empower women and combat traffickers within the diaspora-development ecosystem.

Addressing the Dynamics of Trafficking in Persons Belonging to Minorities

The nexus between trafficking in human beings and discrimination based on race and ethnicity in the OSCE region has rarely been extensively investigated or addressed, despite indications that minority groups, including national minorities, face a higher risk of human trafficking. This underscores the urgent need to address the disproportionate vulnerability of these communities. To confront this issue, the OSCE Office of the Special Representative and Co-Ordinator for Combatting Trafficking in Human Beings is convening a panel discussion, with stakeholders from across the anti-trafficking sector, to explore this nexus and discuss both the existing and possible mechanisms that could empower persons belonging to minorities to mitigate trafficking risks and enhance prevention.

Private Data Exchange: Leveraging advanced technology to prevent trafficking in human beings
