## **LATEST NEWS**

- The OSCE Special Monitoring Mission to Ukraine (SMM) observed a high level of ceasefire violations in Donetsk region with violence concentrated around the usual hotspots: the Avdiivka-Yasynuvata-Donetsk airport triangle; the western and northern outskirts of Horlivka; areas around Shyrokyne and Kominternove; and the Svitlodarsk-Debaltseve road.
- Since 9 July the SMM have seen a sharp increase of ceasefire violations in Luhansk region. A major rise in violence was noted in Stanytsia Luhanska at the only authorized route for crossing the contact line in the entire Luhansk region. Violence also erupted around Shchastia where significant clashes were recorded on the night of 16-17-July.
- The SMM observed numerous weapons missing from storage sites and the presence of weapons in violation of withdrawal lines, quite often in or near residential areas.
- Freedom of movement of SMM monitors continued to be restricted, particularly in areas not controlled by the Government. The restrictions included: denial of access, jamming of SMM Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, a lack of security guarantees from the sides, and direct threats to monitors' security through the positioning and firing of weapons close to an SMM forward patrol base.
