Implementation of the Aarhus Convention in Tajikistan

- Republic of Tajikistan joined the Aarhus Convention on 9 June 2001 after the Decree № 594 of the President of the Republic of Tajikistan. In 2002 the first National Coordinator had been appointed by the Government as well as the National Working Group, which facilitated implementation of the Aarhus Convention in the Republic of Tajikistan during 2001-2013.
- OSCE Office in Tajikistan supported establishment of the first Aarhus Center in Dushanbe, which became the key instrument for realization of Aarhus Convention in the country. In order to facilitate implementation of the Aarhus Convention and strengthen the cooperation between state agencies and civil society organizations in the regions of the country, Aarhus Centers in Khujand (2005), Kurgan-Tyube (2009) and Khorog (2011) had been established within the public organization. Center have conducted awareness raising activities among the public, decision-making bodies, judges, Media representatives and other targeted groups of civil society with support of the OSCE and other Donor organizations and Programmes. In 2013 OSCE supported establishment of the three new Aarhus Centers in Tursunzade, Kumsangir and Garm and launch of Aarhus Centers webpage www.aarhus.tj.
- Thus the Aarhus Centers network covering the whole geographical territory of the Republic of Tajikistan, serve as a platform for cooperation between civil society organizations and governmental structures as well as a source of information on national environmental activities for interested parties.



Aarhus Centers focus on specific regional environmental challenges

All Aarhus Centers conduct activities related to three main directions of the Convention however some activities and functions of the Centers are region specific. For example:

Dushanbe Aarhus Center – Coordinating Center responsible for website maintenance and data collection

Kurgan-Tyube Aarhus Center – Information campaigns

Khorog Aarhus Center – Protection of mountainous ecosystem and regional environmental cooperation with Afghanistan

Khujand Aarhus Center – Campaigns on radioactive safety and regional environmental cooperation with Osh Aarhus Center (Kyrgyzstan)

Challenges

- Lack of National Action Plan as a basis for fulfillment of commitments for implementation of the Convention at national level;
- Lack of procedural documents on realization of the National Legal Acts;
- Poor understanding of business entities of their responsibilities regarding protection and rational use of natural recourses as well as access to necessary ecological information and justice;
- Lack of population's skills to apply ecological information and use their ecological rights.
