Particular attention will be attributed to criminal justice responses to terrorism (including returning FTFS), placement and security measures in prisons; administrative measures to control persons who are considered to pose terrorism-related risks (restrictions on freedom of movement and the right to liberty; deprivation of citizenship, revocation of passports or residence permits etc.); listing and sanctions; surveillance and intelligence gathering/sharing to detect and counterterrorism; measures to prevent mobilization and incitement to terrorism.</li> <li>What measures are being implemented and how? What human rights restrictions do they entail?</li> <li>What measures are put in place to minimize restrictions? What human rights safeguards are in place? How is regular review and effective oversight ensured?</li> <li>What are good practices in cooperation between state and non-state actors in assessing the impact of counter terrorism measures on human rights and prevent adverse effects?</li> </ul>
