Written contribution of Estonia

"INTERNET AND FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION"

Freedom of expression has to apply regardless of the medium used to convey the message. All human beings, regardless of their whereabouts or status should have equal access to knowledge and ideas. After all, safeguarding the freedom of expression and opinion on the Internet is an inseparable part of fundamental rights, dignity and worth of the human person.

At least in theory information has never been as free as it is today. Information networks are helping people all over the world to discover new facts and communicate their ideas to the rest of the world, thus making the governments more accountable. Moreover, the new technology stimulates citizens to take a more active role in the governance of their country.
