Why is the OSCE involved in combating corruption?

- Corruption is a threat to security...
- Corruption, particularly in the customs sector, is an impediment to economic development...
- The OSCE has a clear mandate in both of the above spheres!



The OSCE's mandate in combating corruption

- International Conventions: UN Convention against Corruption; UN Convention against Transnational Organized Crime; CoE Conventions, OECD Convention etc.
- OSCE Ministerial Council Decisions: Sophia (2004), Ljubljana (2005)
- OSCE Economic Forum Meetings: 9th Forum (2001)
- Border Security and Management Concept (BSMC),
 MC Decision No. 11/06



Partnerships

- World Customs Organization (WCO) comprising of 175 member customs administrations
- The World Bank Group
- United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE)
- And others as deemed apropriate



OSCE Customs Integrity Activities

- Supporting the adoption and implementation of existing instruments, standards and norms e.g. the WCO Revised Arusha Declaration through awareness raising, capacity-building/training activities, e.g. Astana (2009), Almaty and Tbilisi (2007)
- Institution-building, supporting the development of new policies (upon request)



WCO Revised Arusha Declaration

10 provisions:

- Leadership and commitment
- Regulatory framework
- Transparency
- Automation
- Reform and modernization
- Audit and investigation
- Code of Conduct
- Human Resources Management
- Moral and organizational culture
- Relationship with the private sector
