Prior to this position, she was Secretary of State of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Portugal, while serving as President of the National Commission for Human Rights. She was also Secretary of State for European Affairs at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Portugal and Deputy Secretary General at the Union for the Mediterranean. Throughout her career, Teresa Ribeiro has held different positions in media, both in Portugal and in multilateral organizations, such as President of the Institute of the Media of Portugal, President of the Steering Committee on Mass Media of the Council of Europe, and Co-founder and first elected President of the Executive Board of Obercom – Media Observatory.

Vladan Joler

Vladan is an academic, researcher and artist, and founder of SHARE Foundation. In 2018, he co- published Anatomy of an AI System, a large-scale map and long-form essay investigating the human labour, data and planetary resources required to build and operate an Amazon Echo device. Previously, he published Facebook Algorithmic Factory, which includes deep forensic investigations and visual mapping of the algorithmic processes and forms of exploitation behind the largest social network. Vladan's research focuses on information warfare, metadata analysis, browsing history exploitation, surveillance, and Internet architecture. His work is included in the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Design Museum in London, and the Ars Electronica Center. His work has been exhibited in more than a hundred international exhibition, and he has received numerous awards. In addition, Vladan is a professor of new media at the University of Novi Sad, and has given lectures at numerous educational and art institutions.

Moritz Riesewieck

Moritz, born in 1985, is a German theatre and film director and author. As a scholarship holder of the German National Academic Foundation, he studied economics and directing at the Ernst Busch Academy of Dramatic Arts in Berlin. His productions and performances have been shown at Schauspiel Dortmund, at the International Forum of the Berlin Theatertreffen and in Mexico City, among others. In 2015, Moritz Riesewieck was invited to the Heidelberger Stückemarkt and was awarded the Elsa Neumann Scholarship of the State of Berlin for his innovative work. Hans Block, Moritz Riesewieck and Cosima Terrasse work together under the label "Laokoon". Their projects, which they develop in various media forms, begin with investigations and end as complex narratives. Riesewieck and Block's debut film 'The Cleaners' about the shadow industry of digital censorship in Manila celebrated its world premiere at the Sundance Film Festival in 2018.



Cosima Terrasse is a french artist part of Laokoon, a collective of artists that combines investigative and scientific research with various forms of creative expression. They develop essays, documentaries, theater productions, lecture performances and radio plays centering on the question of how our concept of man and society is changing in the digital age.
