Statement by Ambassador Yusuf Buluc Permanent Representative of Turkey to the OSCE

Thank you, Ms. Chairperson,

Turkey has aligned itself with the EU statement relating to the trafficking in human beings, but given the importance of the issue, I would like to inform the participants of the efforts taken by Turkey with a view to preventing this contemporary slavery.

Turkey has amended its Penal Code in line with the Palermo Protocol and established trafficking in human beings (THB) as a criminal offence. The list of the means of exploitation consists in prostitution, forced labour or services, slavery and removal of organs, as required by the Protocol. Along with the commission of the offence, those attempting to commit, or participating as accomplice in, as well as organizing and directing others to commit such an offence are held liable to criminal sanctions taking into account the gravity of the offence.

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While prosecution and punishment of the criminals are of vital importance for

combating this phenomenon, prevention of the crime should be given priority

since only the measures taken to this end could help reduce the number of

victims.

Moving from this understanding, Turkey established a National Task Force

(NTF) in 2002, comprising of relevant ministries and agencies as well as NGOs

with whom cooperation protocols have been concluded. The main task of the

Task Force is to ensure effective coordination between the main players. Though

proved successful since its establishment, Turkey has launched a study to

analyze the current functioning of the Task Force and explore ways to increase

its effectiveness and efficiency as well as enable it to enforce is decisions.

I will cite a couple of measures taken in line with the decisions of the Task

Force:

• The "National Action Plan in Fight against Human Trafficking" was

developed by the Task Force and approved by the Prime Minister in

March 2003. The Second National Action Plan in Fight against Human

Trafficking" has been approved by the Prime Minister in June 2009. The

Plan aims at strengthening the relevant institutions combating THB,

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enhancing harmonization with the EU Acquis, and implementing sectoral

action plans developed in this field.

• Turkey has initiated the project on "Supporting Turkey's Efforts to THB

and Promote Access to Justice for All Trafficked Persons" with the

International Organization for Migration (IOM). The components of the

project address variety of needs including the prevention measures as

well as identification and assistance to the victims.

• Safe return home of victims is conducted through the cooperation among

the law enforcement officials, NGOs, contact organizations in the country

of origin and the IOM.

• Shelters have been opened for the victims Istanbul and Ankara where also

free legal assistance is provided.

• Victims are granted humanitarian visas during their stay for medical and

legal purposes.

• The tip-off/emergency helpline 157 has become functional since May

2005 in Turkish, English, Russian and Romanian languages.

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Public awareness campaigns have been launched and brochures prepared

in various languages have been distributed in cities where the trafficking

is encountered at most.

Ms. Chairperson,

While the primary responsibility for combating and preventing trafficking in

human beings rests with the partcipating States, we believe that an effective

action to prevent and combat trafficking in persons, especially children and

women, could be taken only through comprehensive international cooperation

between the countries of origin, transit and destination.

I would like to recall that Turkey is state party to relevant international legal

instruments to combat human trafficking. Turkey has recently signed the

"Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human

Beings". Review of the legislation in order to harmonise with the provisions of

the Convention where necessary with a view to fully implement the Convention

is underway. Turkey will ratify the Convention as soon as the domestic legal

review is concluded.

Last but not least, I would like to draw attention to the importance of efforts to

discourage the demand that fosters exploitation for sexual purposes. As

prescribed in the Council of Europe Convention on Action against THB,

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measures taken to this end help reduce the victimization of the trafficked persons. However, such measures should be complemented with those addressing the offer. A comprehensive study on how to effectively address the question of the offer is needed. This holds true and stands legally imperative in

particular when it comes to introducing criminal sanctions.
