<p>Women’s Rights and Anti-Trafficking Education Project</p>	<p>This project will increase legal literacy among Albanian women by raising awareness of international and domestic laws. Through a training-of-trainers program in three cities, it seeks to increase networking and the spread of information about women’s rights issues. Furthermore, through increased knowledge and community action it will help to address discrimination and abuses of women’s rights including trafficking.</p> <p><i>Timeframe:</i> November 2000 – December 2001 <i>Partners:</i> OSCE Presence to Albania <i>Donor:</i> Switzerland</p>
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<p>Law Enforcement Training</p>	<p>Through this project, a new police training component “policing the human rights of women” was developed. It covers domestic violence, prostitution and trafficking. <p>Raising Public Awareness</p>	<p>In order to raise public awareness of trafficking, this project includes the development and implementation of an educational programme by a Kazakh NGO for at-risk women and girls and their families, review of current legislation available to combat trafficking in Kazakhstan, preparation of informational materials and brochures, and general education through mass media.</p> <p><i>Status:</i> Completed <i>Partners:</i> OSCE Centre in Almaty, Crisis Centre for Women and Children <i>Donors:</i> Core Budget <i>Follow-up:</i> The OSCE Centre in Almaty plans to carry out a Training-of-Trainers program using these materials as one component of its project supported by the Anti-Trafficking Project Fund</p>

Research and Follow-up	<p>Joint project with IOM to identify the incidence and potential for trafficking in women in Kyrgyzstan. The project also assessed the existing policy, legislation and other mechanisms in place to prevent and combat trafficking in women. Evaluation, Prioritization and Co-ordination of National and International Activities	<p>Moldovan government officials, NGOs and relevant international organisations and donors met in Chisinau on 26-27 September 2000 in order to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - raise awareness of the problem of trafficking in Moldova; - exchange information about current and proposed activities to combat trafficking with the aim of increasing co-ordination rather than duplication of efforts and resource allocation; - formulate recommendations for the National Commission to incorporate into a strategic national plan. <p><i>Status:</i> Completed <i>Partners:</i> OSCE Mission to Moldova, Ministry of Labor, Social Protection and Family, Council of Europe, IOM <i>Donors:</i> United States of America</p>

Anti-Trafficking Activities of the ODIHR Office in Podgorica	<p>In 2000, the ODIHR Office in Podgorica hosted a round table discussion between governmental authorities, NGOs, and media to raise awareness of the problem of trafficking in Montenegro and to develop strategies for co-operation. The Office works with women's NGOs to develop their capacity to work on trafficking issues and to improve networking between NGOs and IOs in the region.</p> <p><i>Status:</i> On-going</p>

Training for Professionals in Border Regions	<p>Continuation of support for a project implemented by La Strada-Poland to develop and carry out a series of training workshops to raise awareness about the issue of trafficking in human beings among groups of professionals in border regions of Poland. NGO-Government Round Table	<p>A Round table on trafficking in human beings between NGO and governmental representatives in Romania was held on 30 October 2000 in Bucharest. Research Project on Trafficking in Human Beings	<p>On a regional level, the results of this research in Tajikistan add to the information gathered during ODIHR’s joint project with IOM in Kyrgyzstan. Support for National Council to Prevent Trafficking	<p>Joint project with IOM to constitute, establish and support a national body to develop, oversee and co-ordinate a national strategy and activities to combat trafficking in human beings. Activities included regional training seminars, dissemination of trafficking prevention materials, assessment of anti-trafficking legislation, and development of bilateral links between Ukraine and key destination countries such as Belgium, Greece, Italy and Turkey.</p> <p><i>Status:</i> Completed <i>Partners:</i> OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine, IOM-Kyiv, Government of Ukraine <i>Donors:</i> United Kingdom and Core Budget</p>
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Public Information and Counselling Hotline Services	<p>This project supports information and counselling hotlines and related activities implemented by the NGO La Strada-Ukraine. Objectives include: providing information to potential victims and their families about the risks and consequences of migrating and working abroad, advising them on how to protect themselves against trafficking, counselling and assisting victims of trafficking and their families, collecting and disseminating information on trafficking patterns and trends, and raising public awareness about the problem of trafficking in Ukraine. The ODIHR supported La Strada’s Kyiv hotline throughout 2000. <p>Co-ordinated Action Against Trafficking in Human Beings in South Eastern Europe</p>	<p>The goal of this seminar held in Athens from 29 June to 1 July 2000 was to assist governmental representatives to develop recommendations for national action and to identify areas for co-ordinated activities at the regional level.
