These assaults not only jeopardize the safety and professional livelihoods of individual journalists but also erode the indispensable function of a free and autonomous press in upholding accountability, nurturing transparency, and enlightening the public on issues that matter to them.

Today's gathering, themed "Beyond the Headlines: Protecting Journalists to Advance Media Freedom" offers an opportunity to forge connections, cultivate networks, and engage in substantive dialogues and exchanges. Together, we aim to discuss prevailing challenges, celebrate constructive endeavours, and pioneer innovative approaches, all with the overarching objective of bolstering the safety of journalists across South-East Europe.

As outlined in the agenda before you, you will have an opportunity to engage in two interactive sessions.

One is a workshop on digital safety where together with our cyber-security expert, Jorge Luis Sierra, you will be equipped with practical tools, techniques and knowledge to protect yourself from digital security risks. After the lunch break, during the World Café session, you'll be invited to participate in dynamic group discussions, to share insights and experiences. We will explore effective initiatives and good practices for safeguarding journalists' digital and psychological well-being. Additionally, we will introduce two of our new resources: the Safety of Journalists Toolbox and the "Guidelines for monitoring online violence against female journalists". Next, you'll gain insight into two regional endeavours: one addressing the implementation of the EU Digital Service Act in the Western Balkans, and another one highlighting the psychological support services offered by the Trade Union of Media of Montenegro.

I will not keep you longer from what I am certain will be a productive and enlightening event that will inspire innovative ideas for positive change and will hopefully spark renewed determination to safeguard journalist safety.
