OSCE Commitments in the field of good environmental governance

Framework for Good Environmental Governance: Global

- **Global Conferences** (Stockholm, Rio, Jo'burg, Rio+20, trade/development conferences)
- 2015 SDGs Sustainable Development Agenda for 2030
- Paris Agreement
- Sendai Framework on DRR





Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels

16.4 by 2030 significantly reduce illicit financial and 16.9 by 2030 provide legal identity for all including arms flows, strengthen recovery and return of stolen assets, and combat all forms of organized crime

16.10 ansure quable access to information.

16.3 promote the rule of law at the national and international levels, and ensure equal access to justice for all

assets, and combat all forms of organized crime
16.10 ensure public access to information and protect
fundamental freedoms, in accordance with national
legislation and international agreements

TARGETS
16.1 significantly reduce all forms of violence and 16.6 develop effective, accountable and transparent 16.a strengthen relevant national institutions, including through international cooperation, for building capacities at all levels, in particular in developing of violence and torture against children

16.7 ensure responsive, inclusive, participatory and of violence and torture against children

16.8 strengthen relevant national institutions, including through international cooperation, for building capacities at all levels, in particular in developing capacities of the preventing violence and combatting terrorism and crime

 - Convention on Environmental Impact Assessment in a Transboundary Context (Espoo, 1991)
 - Protocol on Strategic Environmental Assessment (Kyiv, 2003)
 - Convention on Transboundary Effects of Industrial Accidents (Helsinki, 1992)
 - Convention on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes (Helsinki, 1992)



Framework for Good Environmental Governance: National

- **EU** acquis communautaire relevant for a large part of the OSCE area
- High level of performance of OSCE participating States on the Environmental Democracy Index (EDI)



Implementation of OSCE Commitments: participating States

- Adherence to international legal instruments
- Enhancing environmental governance on the national level
 - Strategic planning
 - Implementation of Information and Participation laws
 - Reporting/compliance mechanisms
 - Influence of EU acquis
 - Public-private partnerships



Implementation of OSCE Commitments: OSCE projects

- Environmental governance related projects of OSCE
 - The Environment and Security (ENVSEC) Initiative
 - Network of Aarhus Centres





Policy Gaps and Challenges
