

IMPUNITY FOR MURDERS OF JOURNALISTS: A CHALLENGE TO FREEDOM OF THE MEDIA

ANNOTATED AGENDA

In 1994, in Budapest, the OSCE participating States condemned all attacks on and harassment of journalists and decided to endeavour to hold those directly responsible for such attacks accountable. The OSCE Representative on Freedom of the Media (RFoM) Harlem Désir considers his first priority the safety and protection of journalists, and the fight to end impunity for crimes committed against them. This year several journalists have lost their lives because of their work, most recently, Daphne Caruana Galizia in Malta who was killed because she was an independent and free journalist.

Human rights NGOs have been sounding the alarm for years and in 2016 the number of threats against individual journalists and media outlets, reached a record high. The OSCE RFoM has seen a sharp increase in cases of intimidation and harassment of female journalists. Clearly, there is a lack of progress in the fight against impunity. In over 90% of cases of violence against journalists in the OSCE region, the perpetrators and masterminds have yet to be brought to justice.

The safety of journalists worldwide has increasingly attracted the attention of policy-makers, professional and academic communities in recent years. A number of major international and national organisations dedicate considerable amount of time and effort to observe the state of journalists' safety around the world, in particular, through monitoring the murders of journalists. Empirical evidence of the current environment and working conditions for journalists who provide information to the public and ultimately support democratic processes is as important for policy-makers as for advocacy groups for the protection of journalists. A recent study by the University of Vienna (Killings of Journalists Worldwide: The Full Costs of a Free Press) compared and analysed available databases on killings of journalists and concluded that, although monitoring by multiple actors is important in terms of crosschecking, and plurality of sources, as well as in terms of providing visibility to the issue of safety, methodological discrepancies and difficulties emerge when attempting to gain a full picture of the situation.

The round table portion of this meeting will bring together experts from the Council of Europe, UNESCO, Reporters without Borders, the International Federation of Journalists, the European Federation of Journalists, the Association of European Journalists, Article 19, the Committee to Protect Journalists, Index on Censorship and other organizations. They will discuss practical, methodological and ethical dilemmas in the process of collecting information and monitoring the deaths of journalists. The issue of developing robust methodologies and global collaborative synergies to compile the most accurate and comprehensive data is the core theme of this round table, which will explore the ways in which improvements and amendments to current practices might benefit the ability of the OSCE and international community at large to enhance journalists' safety.
