### SESSION III: Firearm tracing in practice – Establishing a common approach

Co-operation of law enforcement agencies in effectively tracing SALW/firearms may facilitate their investigative efforts. However, there needs to be adequate legislative and investigative approaches to enable investigation and prosecution using tracing data as valid evidence. A number of initiatives and tools have been developed at the international/regional levels to facilitate tracing of SALW/firearms. This Session will particularly explore the framework for international cooperation and will focus on the application and benefits of the INTERPOL Illicit Arms Records and tracing Management System (iARMS) for SALW/firearms tracing. It will also allow sharing national experience and best practices.
