YES. The Republic of Poland deposited the ratification instrument to the Ottawa Convention on the prohibition of the use, stockpiling, production and transfer of anti-personnel mines and on their destruction on the 27th December 2012. In relation to Poland the Convention entered into force on the 1st June 2013.

No, but as far as Polish citizens are concerned general regulations exist. Mine/UXO survivors are entitled to the same standards of public healthcare as all other insured persons. Military casualties are entitled to medicine and orthopaedic equipment free of charge.

INFORMATION TO THE ARMED FORCES:

All soldiers of the Polish Armed Forces are instructed and trained in the International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict including the rules set by the Convention on Certain Conventional Weapons and its annexed Protocols.

The relevant information is disseminated to them in the framework of:

- military and postgraduate studies, operational-tactical studies, operational-strategic studies and qualification courses dedicated for candidates for professional officers, officers, military commanders and legal advisers organized by Military Universities, Academies and Officer's Schools:
- training, special and qualification courses for officers, non-commissioned officers, privates and civilian personnel realized in training centers of all armed services;
- the routine process of improving professional qualifications of military personnel conducted by superiors and legal advisers in all military units;
- military exercises which require taking into account specific rules of the International Humanitarian Law norms and regulations.

Training in international law of armed conflicts and protection of cultural heritage is an important element of the preparation process of personnel for the peacekeeping and stabilization missions. All mission members are obliged to

attend such training before deployment. In 2016 Polish Air Force Academy (PAFA) and Polish Naval Academy (PNA) organized international science conferences related to the International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict (including CCW and annexed Protocols). They were addressed to civilians and military personnel. Additionally PNA published the "International Humanitarian Law" yearbook.

INFORMATION TO THE CIVILIAN POPULATION:

Civilian students received relevant information concerning the International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict (including CCW and annexed Protocols) during optional or obligatory courses organized by Polish Military Universities, Academies and Officer's Schools.

The Center for the Dissemination of International Humanitarian Law (IHL) under the auspices of the Main Board of the Polish Red Cross (PRC), operating since 1977 is tasked with the dissemination of information on IHL and the mission of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement.

The Center is running the largest IHL Library (over 5 thousand volumes) which contains a special section on conventional weapons regulations. The library is used by students and post-graduates in law, political sciences, and international relations, as well as secondary school students and PRC workers and volunteers from across the country.

During 2016 the PRC Center for Dissemination of IHL organized a number of seminars, meetings and lectures devoted to international humanitarian law. Most of them were focused on legal aspects of landmines (including II Protocol to the CCW). It is worth mentioning a couple of the most important events:

- XX Polish School of International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict in Radziejowice
- an annual 5-day course for law and international relations students from civil and military universities, representatives of the Armed Forces, the Police, the Border Guard, the State Rire Service, Red Cross employees and volunteers. Lectures were given by experts on IHL from major Polish Universities and Armed Forces,
- Several lectures on means and methods of warfare during IHL courses for armed forces organized by War Studies University,
- Continuation of a e-learning course "Exploring humanitarian law" dedicated to the teachers of basic and secondary schools,
- XIX edition of Professor Remigiusz Bierzanek contest for the best PH. D., MA and BA thesis in humanitarian law and human rights and knowledge about the International Red Cross and Red Cross Movement;
- Coordination of the activities of the Commission for the Protection of the Emblem and related actions, including assessment of applications for use of the emblem and interventions in the event of misuse on a national scale.
- Coordination of the activities of the IHL Dissemination Commission including initiatives on promotion and dissemination of IHL, networking and knowledge sharing and publication and promotion of books.

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION ON MINE CLEARANCE:

In 2016 the Polish Ministry of Foreign Affairs contributed with 50 thousand US dollars in support of UNMAS's actions in Gaza ("Mitigation of the threat posed by explosive hazards in Gaza"). In the last two years Poland's total financial assistance to mine action and mitigation in Gaza amounted to 85 thousand US dollars. Gaza continues to be contaminated with ERWs consisting of uexploded aircraft bombs, tank shells and other munitions. For 2017 UNMAS has identified the following priorities in Gaza: protection of civilians from ERW threats, support to reconstruction activities and emergency preparedness.

At the reporting period Polish Armed Forces contributed to the alleviation of humanitarian problem caused by landmines, unexploded ordnance (UXO), improvised explosive devices (IEDs) and other explosive remnants of war (ERW). This was possible through the participation of the Polish Engineering Forces personnel in the stabilizing mission in Afghanistan. The PEF activities among others included: removal and destruction of mines, UXO, IEDs and other explosive remnants of war (in cases of emergency).

In 2016 6 Polish deminers formed an emergency team for demining and clearin operations. The unit remained on stand by and did not participate directly in m clearance activities.	_
