# **Online platforms analyzed**

- sites advertising escort services,
- massage services,
- broader 'classifieds' advertising platforms,
- advertising aggregators,
- hobby boards,
- sugar daddy sites,
- dating and social networking websites,
- > and other forums as appropriate to the local market.





# 4,189 websites were identified in these 56 countries



# Information collected

- a. Name
- b. URL
- Size number of advertisements, evidence of use (such as, recent and relatively high volume of new advertisements being added)
- d. Services range, types available and prices when advertised
- e. Geographical scope: International/national/regional/loc al - including regional prevalence (for example, to determine whether a site's popularity and use differs regionally)
- f. Denotation of Ethnicity/National Origin: whether advertised

providers are primarily local or foreign

- g. Links to social media profiles
   (Instagram, Facebook etc.), or
   phone numbers
- h. Notes on the site
- Any connections between sites some will look exactly the same but have different names
- j. Any company affiliation
- k. Language
- Category e.g. hobby board, catalogue, brothel
- m. Particular lingo
- n. Whether advertising space is owned or rented



### Results

- In one country, a website offered "virginity auctions" for club members only.
  - Navigating the "virgins" link: **observed a number of visibly very young girls**
- In some countries, buyers can "rent" a person in prostitution for 7, 14 or 21 days for sexual services, which indicates lack of freedom and movement of that person
  - On many sites, the involvement of third parties (pimps) was observed
  - Same persons involved in prostitution were advertised in different locations across the border of neighbouring countries, which shows frequent movement





✓ The overarching goal of this report is to respond to the threat of technology*facilitated THB* by building increased awareness about websites that facilitate sexual exploitation

✓ The report was designed to *identify* — *in* selected OSCE participating States — the market-leading online sites and platforms for the explicit and non-explicit selling of sexual services where victims of THB for sexual exploitation could be advertised



# **ExB Tech-Facilitated THB**

# Planned target 1 - At least 5 more OSCE pS adopt/develop legislation to combat technology-facilitated THB

- Three initiated the amendment of the Criminal Code to include aspects related to technology-facilitated THB;
- Two initiated the amendment of the Criminal Procedure Code to include aspects related to technology-facilitated THB;
- Four initiated the drafting of policies and legislation to require online platforms to address technology-facilitated THB;
- ✓ Nine initiated the drafting of policies and legislation to enable the use of technology tools to address technology-facilitated THB;
- Twelve proposed to include the response to technology-facilitated THB in the National Action Plan to Combat THB.

Planned target 2 - At least 5 OSCE pS adopt the standard operating procedures on addressing technology-facilitated THB

- ✓ Fourteen (14) beneficiaries reported that they updated the existing or developed new standard operating procedures on addressing technology-facilitated THB;
- Eleven (11) beneficiaries reported that they established new partnerships with stakeholders involved in addressing technology-facilitated THB.



Planned target 3 - At least 5 OSCE pS adopt the curriculum for police academies on technology facilitated THB

- **Eleven** (11) beneficiaries reported that they introduced or updated the existing training courses on technology-facilitated THB in the training/educational institutions.



# Planned target 4 - At least 20 OSCE pS use the mapping methodology and indicators at the national level

40 countries were trained on the mapping methodology during the four sub-regional workshops throughout 2023
