12.00 – 13.30	SESSION II: How is disinformation growing and how to counter it?		
	A growing number of states in the OSCE area decided to regulate and penalise online content, particularly, such content on social networks which is perceived as threatening the democratic institutions and provoking		

unrest. Yet, journalists as gate-keepers of democracy have long been professionally dealing with false information, tainted sources and biased narratives. Among participating States there is increased attention to media literacy for citizens and a growing number of fake-busting online resources. Would their tools be enough to inoculate the society against dangerous messages?

### Side event 1 (room "Zaysan"): User generated content: response, risk, responsibility

According to media monitoring, about 25% of Kyrgyzstan's Internet users have contributed to the production of news, provided comments on news topics, and shared news through social media. The latest trends show a growing user participation in the news process. Professional media make heavy use of user-generated content. In fact, this phenomenon has challenged long-standing journalistic values and changed journalism itself. There are new risks and a need for increased responsibility. What should be an optimal relationship between journalist- and user-generated content? What are the obstacles, and challenges to achieving it? The presenter will raise these questions at the side event.

Fact-checking and media literacy in the context of posttruth era and more hi-tech disinformation become strategically important.

At the same time fact-checking has gone beyond being simply a genre of journalism and is now an integral ingredient of media and information literacy which needs to be included in the education system.

Following, for instance, the appearance of "deep-fakes", it became obvious that public authorities are more and more interested in fact-checking and media literacy of citizens and want to have strong, professional media in their countries to tell the difference between fakes and factual news.

Another important issue is a need to respect the principles of freedom of expression as governments sometimes use the need to combat disinformation as a pretext to stamp down dissent and opposition.
