FACTS MATTER

- Between 25 March and 7 April, the SMM confirmed that one civilian was killed and five were injured. This brings the total number of civilian casualties since 1 January 2019 to 20 (three deaths and 17 injuries).
- The SMM recorded 14,700 ceasefire violations (about 17,500 in the previous two-week period); and observed 225 weapons in violation of the agreed withdrawal lines (110 in areas not controlled by the Government).
- The Mission continued to observe anti-tank mines and unexploded ordnance (UXO). In particular, its unmanned aerial vehicles spotted 56 anti-tank mines near Novotoshkivske and at least 100 mines north-west of Oleksandrivka. The SMM facilitated and monitored adherence to the ceasefire in Stanytsia Luhanska to enable the removal of UXO from a residential area. On 4 April, the SMM monitored and participated in events marking International Day for Mine Awareness and Assistance in Mine Action. The Chief Monitor and the OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine issued a joint statement (https://www.osce.org/special-monitoring-mission-to-ukraine/416210), highlighting the importance of mine action. In the previous 12 months, at least 70 people 18 of them children have been killed or injured by mines or UXO in eastern Ukraine.
- The Mission continued to observe hardship faced by civilians at entry-exit checkpoints (EECP). In the reporting period, the EECPs in Hnutove and Marinka which are ordinarily used by an estimated 10,000 people a day were temporarily closed, causing long delays, in some cases lasting three days, at other EECPs. A 60-year-old man died as he passed through the pedestrian EECP near Stanytsia Luhanska. He is one of 18 mostly elderly people to have died since December from mostly heart-related complications as they crossed the contact line.
- The Chief Monitor welcomed the consensus decision to extend the SMM's Mandate, thanking all 57 OSCE participating States for their continued support (https://www.osce.org/special-monitoring-mission-to-ukraine/415664).
