- training, special and qualification courses for officers, non-commissioned officers, privates and civilian personnel conducted in training centers of all armed services and in all military units;

- the routine process of improving professional qualifications of military personnel conducted by superiors and legal advisors in all military units;

- military exercises which require taking into account specific rules of the International Humanitarian Law norms and regulations;

- international and national conferences related to the International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict (including CCW and its Protocols);
