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EU statement on legislation on religion in Kazakhstan

The EU has noted that on September 24, the lower chamber of the Kazakh

parliament, the Majilis, passed in the second reading the draft law "On

amendments and addenda to some legislative acts on freedom of religion and

religious associations".

We are pleased that Kazakhstan had requested the ODIHR's expert advice,

through the OSCE/ODIHR Panel of Experts on Freedom of Religion or Belief, on

the draft religion law and has cooperated with the ODIHR on this matter. We

welcome the fact that some changes were made to the draft to accommodate

concerns raised by some experts.

However, the EU regrets that the law-making process has not been sufficiently

transparent and inclusive to alleviate all these concerns. One useful step in

that regard might be making public the ODIHR review of the draft legislation.

The EU shares concerns about aspects of the draft legislation which seem to

impose restrictions on the right to have, adopt and manifest religion or belief

through association, worship or education and to increase control over religious

groups and communities.

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Freedom of religion or belief is a key OSCE commitment. We note that inter-

religious dialogue and religious pluralism is an area to which Kazakhstan

attaches particular importance. As Kazakhstan's Chairmanship of the OSCE

draws nearer, the EU encourages Kazakhstan to ensure that its legislation

adequately reflects this approach, in order for it to fully live up to the country's

OSCE commitments and international human rights standards.

The EU therefore calls on the Senate to reconsider the draft legislation to make

sure that it is in line with Kazakhstan's OSCE commitments. We further

express our hope that Kazakhstan will continue its cooperation with the ODIHR

and are pleased that further consultations between ODIHR and Kazakhstan

appear to be planned.
